HEAR IT, FEEL IT, LIVE IT, SHARE IT – GOD'S LOVE

Dear siblings in Christ,

As we enter into April, we know that Spring is just around the corner! Sure, when I look out the window, there is still snow on the ground—but there are also patches of open ground, brown grass slowly being warmed by the ever-strengthening sun. And as the days grow longer, and the weather gets a little warmer, I got to thinking about my younger daughter, Edie.

See, last time the weather was warm, she didn't even really realize it. In her young memory, the world has always been a cold, white, windy place. I wonder what kind of joy she'll experience when she gets to see a dandelion poke up from the grass for the first time? How will she laugh when her sister shows her what tulips are, and the way the green buds on the trees slowly fold out to become leaves? How will she experience new life?

That's the anticipation I hope we all feel from time to time when we come around again to Holy Week. This sacred set of days marking the most important days in the history of the universe are days that point us in one unquestionable, undeniable, unassailable direction—new life.

New life, filling the world with hope and wonder! New life, freeing us from the weight of the terrors of sin and death! New life, giving us a new direction into the kingdom of God that makes us whole!

What does new life look like to you? Does it look like the joyful bursts of color and light of a fireworks display that announces to the world the Christ is risen? Does it look like the quiet solemnity of reading the twenty-second Psalm or reciting the solemn reproaches, reminding you of the power of forgiveness and the depth of God's love for you? Does it look like seeing the flowers bloom as God brings the whole world back to life after months of cold and quiet whiteness? Does it look like thunderstorms washing away the last of the sand and salt from the road, heralding the warm weather to come? What new life brings you joy? What new life do you want to share with others?

I hope you experience the joy and wonder of returning new life this Holy Week, and that the love, passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus gives you a moment for wonder at what this new life we've been given looks like. And as the days continue to warm and lengthen, I hope you'll continue to see God at work, all around you, making all things new and filled with life!

Easter Message from Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson

April 2023

Matthew 28 After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it... the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, for he has been raised, as he said... go quickly and tell his disciples."

Dear Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,
Join me and that great cloud of witnesses this Easter in the acclamation:
Christ is Risen,
He is Risen indeed, Alleluia!



The gospel reading for this Easter is from the book of Matthew. Matthew is the only gospel writer that records an **earthquake** on Easter morning. The women arrive at the tomb and are greeted by an earthquake, an angel rolling back the stone, and the news that their Lord and Savior wasn't there, **JESUS HAD BEEN RAISED FROM THE DEAD**. What? The women were filled with shock and fear. The aftershocks of this earthquake are still felt. The news that death doesn't win and is defeated by the power of God in Christ Jesus continues to shock and amaze us.

What if we imagined Easter not as a lovely spring ritual filled with pastel-colored eggs and candy but as the violent earthquake that it is? Few living in the Midwest have experienced an earthquake. A pastor born in California remembers her mother putting rubber bands on the kitchen cupboard handles so the china dishes wouldn't fall out when there was an earthquake. When has a death of a loved one shaken the foundation of your world? When have you realized how fragile life can be? Christ's resurrection from the dead, his victory over sin, death, and the devil shakes up everything. It is the good news that can even shake us loose from our grief.

What if we experienced Easter as a violent earthquake more like a fresh egg dropped to the floor than one hard-boiled and beautifully decorated? What if the Easter Earthquake shakes us awake, shakes everything out of the cupboards and closets so we are forced to do spring cleaning and decide what to put back and what to throw out? What if we get rid of stuff that doesn't work and give more space to what's important? What is really important? What is God's will for you? What are our Easter priorities?

What if this year the Easter Earthquake cracks open and rolls away the stone from our hearts, shakes loose old ideas, breaks down rock-hard prejudices, and opens us up to new ways to love our neighbor and to share this amazing good news that Jesus lives? What new life might rise up from the rubble? What new relationships might develop? Like a chick struggles to break free of the egg's shell, new beginnings are rarely easy, but they are worth it. The good news is that Christ's resurrection from the dead and his victory over death is good news even to those who have experienced a literal shifting of tectonic plates beneath the earth. On February 6, 2023, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake hit Turkey and Syria leaving over 50,000 people dead and hundreds of thousands more wounded, displaced, or homeless. More than 10,000 aftershocks have been felt since February 6 leading to more deaths, fear, and trauma. The aftershocks will continue for a long time.

This Easter, in response to the earthquake that opened the tomb and to the good news that Jesus has been raised from the dead, I encourage you to give a gift to the Lutheran Disaster Response to help the victims of the Earthquake in Turkey and Syria. Insurance: Our insurance agreement is due at the end of the year. Another company has looked over and taken measurements of the church. We will discuss their quote at April's council meeting.

Ellsworth Chamber Info- Four council members attended the Chamber Awards Dinner. We are eager to participate in the opportunities to get involved in the community in connection with the chamber. There will be a discussion group on March 28, at the Middle school IMC.

Excess money market fund investments: Donna made a motion, seconded by Lanette, to purchase a twelve month and an eighteen-month CD for \$50,000 each. M/C They will be purchased from Edward Jones, in River Falls.

Ministry Planning Event: The council and committee members are invited to discuss projects for this year. It will be on Thursday, March 23, from 6-8 pm. There will be a potluck dinner followed by the meeting.

Committee Reports-

Audit-2022 Report: The committee audited the savings and checking accounts, as well as WELCA and the Endowment funds. The committee checked for signatures with the new council. Other findings: Four checks had not cleared in 2019 and 2020. Debbi will void and reissue them. Endowment Funds: The statements are paperless. The Audit committee asks that a printed year end statement be added to records. A binder should be set up to include all the records. The Audit Committee also asks the council to look into a long range solution for having money to go toward the fuel and insurance bills ahead of time. The council will discuss the fuel bill options in the April council meeting.

Nominating Committee: Donna made a motion, seconded by John, to appoint Lanette to fill the one-year term left by Gabe Fuerhelm and Audrey Severson to fill the two-year term left by Bridget Peterson. M/C

It is a lot of fun and helps the FFA keep this amazing Fundraiser going, which raises the money for the scholarships the FFA hands out and helps our Church as well. A few hours of your time would be an amazing gift to give and will help many people and our Church.

*Heads up - we are signed up to do the same thing at the Cheese Curd Festival and that one pays an hourly wage plus a percentage of the profit. Watch for more info on that in the near future.

Money raised from this event goes to support our FFA members by providing ag classroom resources, funding for FFA member leadership conferences, state, and national FFA conventions, Supervised Agriculture Experience grants, and post-secondary scholarships. In the 15-year history of our Showdown in Curd Town, we have donated almost \$200,000 to support our agriculture students and other school and community groups.

Men In Mission Meeting
March 18, 2023

After breakfast served by Brian Johnson and Bill Bowen, devotions were led by Pastor Lucas.

The business meeting was called to order by Pres. Lemoine Baker.

The secretary's report was read and approved.

Reporting for treasurer Tom Holdorf, Clair reported that we have \$4462 in the firsthand fund, \$2664 in the general fund, and \$4477 in the Luther Point Bible Camp fund. We made \$840 at the oyster stew/soup event, \$400 going to the Luther Point Bible Camp fund and \$440 to the general fund. \$190 from the Feb. coffee hour was deposited in the general fund and \$100 from the Endowment Fund (a year ago) deposited in the LPBC fund. CLair reported that we are paying Pierce-Pepin about \$50 a month for electricity at the ball park during the off season, anywhere from \$165 to over \$300 per month during the summer. We pay over \$1000 per year. The treasurer's report was approved.

Old Business: Donna reported that a ball park work date will be scheduled later. \$65,000 has been raised for the new concession stand addition and construction will start this spring.

New Business: Motion made by David Jordahl/Ron Halverson to raise church softball fee from \$200 a team to \$225 to help offset the ball park electrical bill.

Motion made by Donna/David J. to have Clair purchase 5 boxes of poison worms to help lower the mole population at the ball park.

Clair mentioned that Barry Stockwell will probably be calling to use the cooler sometime within the next month. The council has agreed to rent it to him for \$100. We need to check out its condition beforehand. We have had the cooler since 2012.

Clair reported that on July 28th, there will not be a motocross at the fair grounds. Instead, there will be a concert featuring Chris Kroeze. Our stand will be open as usual, raising money for the youth. Pop/water will be furnished by the MIM/fair fund as usual. Donna and Patricia are working on a menu upgrade featuring pork chop on a stick.

Motion made by Tim W./Clair to have our Annual pancake breakfast on Sunday, April 30th. We will serve from right after church until 11:30. Donna is handling publicity to other churches and Pierce-Pepin. Clair will apply for a Thrivent Action Team to help pay expenses.

The menu: Pancakes with real maple syrup, sausages, scrambled eggs and ham, coffee, juice, and milk. All proceeds will go to the Pierce County Food Shelf.

(Pancake flour - Sturdiwheat RW, 20 lbs. sausage - Pierce co. meats, 14 doz. eggs, 2 pts.sour cream, 2 gal.milk, 3 lbs. butter, milk for the pancake mix, 2 gal. juice, ham to be sliced up from Nilssen's.)

We will serve coffee tomorrow, March 19th.

Saturday, May 20th, 8:00 am is the next MIM meeting. Clair and Tim W. serving.

MIM will serve coffee on Sunday, May 21st.

Motion to adjourn. 10 members present.
