HEAR IT, FEEL IT, LIVE IT, SHARE IT - GOD'S LOVE

March 2024

Dear siblings in Christ,

At a workshop at this year's Synod event Walking Together, the question was raised about a phrase I think we all are fond of: "All Are Welcome." It's a lovely phrase that, when we look at it, sounds like we are extending a welcome to anyone and everyone who wants to come. Our doors are open. When we use it as a church, we are saying that you don't have to be perfect to come worship; you don't have to be flawless before you can serve God. All are welcome.

But that's not always what many people hear. Some people have experienced churches that claim "all are welcome," and have regularly experienced the footnote to that phrase: "as long as you're willing to become like us." Now, we may not intend for that, and we may not even feel that way. It may even make you upset reading this, because it sounds like you're being unfairly accused of judging others. But, and this is important, it's not really about you.

There are enough churches that have used the phrase "all are welcome" while not mentioning the footnote that when certain groups of people (especially LGBTQ+, but others as well) are suspicious. They've seen this wording before. And they've been rejected. They've been told to change who they are. They've seen the stares that tell them to leave. They've been told they're not worthy—whether in words or by the excluding behavior of the congregation. It's a phrase that has become, unfortunately, loaded with subtext that can only be disproven to people who have experienced rejection if they're willing to risk experiencing rejection again. So what can we do? How can we counter that footnote that we don't want to be there?

The simple answer is be explicit. Who do you welcome? Who is included? Who do we know who reads that phrase and immediately doubts it? We have to have the bravery to name the people we welcome, because if we don't, then the footnote sticks around for exactly the people we want to welcome. And that's the challenging part. Because when we start getting specific, that's when we start getting into trouble.

But Jesus was specific, wasn't he? He went to the cross to save all lives, but he explicitly named whose lives were being saved because they had always been told they weren't saved: prostitutes, tax collectors, sinners of all kinds. He named the Samaritans and the Gentiles as worthy of salvation, even though such a proclamation would win him enemies among his fellow Jews. Specificity is dangerous, but it's also essential, because when you've always experienced being sent outside even by people who claimed you could come in, you start to assume that's where everyone stands.

So this Lent, and as we continue to serve this community in Jesus's name, let's think about who hears "all" and assumes they're not included, because they never are. Let's be explicit about who God loves, because some people have always been told they aren't loved. Let's be daring enough to get specific, even if it gets us into hot water, because in Christ, God calls us to be specific. God has called us by name; shouldn't we call others by name too?

In Christ, Pastor Lucas God calls us to the waters of baptism, and as we enter the months ahead, keep in mind the following dates that are open for baptisms.

Easter 2024 A Message from Bishop Laurie Rummaging for God

Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed. Alleluia!



Does your house have a junk drawer? Do you ever find yourself going through this drawer full of stuff; feeling around looking for something that you are sure must be in there somewhere? Twist ties from bread wrappers, pens, batteries, rubber bands, nail clippers, scissors, matches, superglue, glass cleaner, coins, tiny screwdriver, ChapStick, charger cables, sticky notes... Rummaging around in your junk drawer might seem like a strange illustration for an Easter message, but I invite you to consider your memory of past life events as your junk drawer.

Think back on last year's Easter celebration. What do you remember? Rummage around in those memories to see if you can find God. You are pretty sure God is there somewhere but where? Where did you experience God last Easter? Was it in church, at the sunrise service, a sermon, a Bible reading, a hymn, an Easter egg hunt in the park, a gathering with family or friends, or a walk in the woods later that day? How did you experience God and the miracle of Christ's resurrection last Easter?

Now, think back over your lifetime, a lifetime of Easter celebrations, for me that 66 Easters. Where did you see or experience God and the power of the resurrection, God's transforming love that defeated death and gives new life?

Looking back over a day, a year, a lifetime is a spiritual practice called the Examen. Essentially it is rummaging through our memories, looking for when and how God was present. The Examen is a form of daily prayer that invites us to examine our day to find God. Finding God in all things and at all times gives us the strength for that next most faithful step.

I wondered what must have been going through Mary Magdalene's mind as she walked to the tomb that first Easter morning. Was she rummaging through all the memories of her time walking with Jesus? Was she trying to remember every word Jesus said? Was she looking for a clue, some way to make sense of what happened on Friday? Where was God in all of this? How could this possibly bring in God's kingdom? She must have missed something. She saw him die. How could Jesus' death be part of God's plan?

Mary arrived at the tomb and found the stone rolled away. She didn't find what she was looking for. The body wasn't there. It still made no sense. Did someone steal his body? She knows that God is in all of this, but where? She continues to search with Peter and John and finally after they leave she enters the tomb and through her tears sees the angels and then a gardener, but not a gardener but the teacher, the risen Savior; and finally through her tears she sees God. (John 20)

John 20:11 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb.

Look back over a day, a year, a lifetime of trips you've made to some tomb. Was it the place that held the body of loved one, a dream that had died, a relationship that ended, or a hope that had been crushed? Rummage around in those memories to find what you know is there somewhere, God. Through the tears see the angels, the messengers; the ordinary people, those who helped you and see God!

Dear Friends, I invite you to rummage through all the memories in the junk drawer of life and find God. Think back over a lifetime, a lifetime of trips to the tomb and Easter celebrations. See God and the power of the resurrection. See God's transforming love that defeated death and gives new life. May seeing God in all of life give you the courage and strength to take your next most faithful step.
